Eight Takeaways from Hanukkah

Hanukkah 2024 begins on the evening of Wednesday, December 25th. While the Hanukkah story took place 2,000 years ago, this Festival of Lights has much to teach us today. Amidst varying interpretations of the holiday's significance, we offer eight takeaways for you this season.

- 1. **Believing in miracles doesn't hurt you, and it can actually help you**. The story of Hanukkah is literally fantastic, and it truly doesn't matter if the miracle of the oil "really" happened or not. Jewish thought emphasizes the value of belief in miracles, as a means to foster faith, hope, inner strength and a sense of a divine presence. In a challenging reality, when it is often hard to remain optimistic, it is a belief in what seems impossible that grants us the strength we so badly need. It was David Ben-Gurion who said: "Anyone who doesn't believe in miracles is not a realist."
- 2. **Hope for miracles but take responsibility for action**. The story of Hanukkah is not just about a Godly miracle in the form of oil lasting for eight days, but rather in the faith a small group of Jews had that they could defeat a much greater enemy and maintain their freedom of religion. Never doubt the power of the few, never doubt the effect a single action can have to make a difference.
- 3. **Make things last**. Hanukkah commemorates the story that a small quantity of oil, expected to light the Temple's menorah for just one night, miraculously lasted eight nights. Many times in life, we only have a limited resource available to us, be it money, time, or energy etc. It is up to us to find ways to most efficiently use our resource, make them last for a longer time so that we can get the most benefit out of them.
- 4. **Be proud of who you are.** Jewish resilience is central to Hanukkah's historic significance. The Hanukkah story recalls Jewish religious oppression during the reign of Antiochus IV. Revolts against this reign led by the Maccabees were in the name of religious freedom, and ultimately the fight for freedom prospered. 2000 years after the original stroy of Hanukkah, we still find ourselves in a battle for our religious freedom and for the right to live in safety as Jews, here and in Israel. The villains of the Hanukkah story are long gone, but we are still here to tell the story, and to be proud of us doing so.
- 5. The best way to rejoice is by sharing the joy with others. We are supposed to light our Hanukiyot near the windows of our homes so that the light can be seen from the outside. This is a very important aspect of the holiday, our ability to share the light of freedom with others, our reminder to the world that one small candle can cast a big light. Another form of sharing our blessing is giving gelt and in our days Hanukkah gifts and doing so to teach our kids about the value of tzedakah and giving.

- **6. Rededicate to a cause**. Hanukkah means to rededicate, representing the rededication of the temple after the Maccabee-led revolt which allowed Jewish people to maintain their identities. During Hanukkah we will welcome in the Gregorian New Year. With 2025 swiftly approaching, let us consider resolutions that make an impact. Hanukkah is the perfect backdrop to rededicate ourselves to being the best version of ourselves and taking action to better the lives of those around us and of those in need of our help.
- 7. Celebrate what is new and keep increasing your gratitude: Hanukkah candles are lit from left to right, with the first lit being the newest addition. Each night of Hanukkah as we increase the number of candles, we build upon the previous night and intentionally add to what was. This building not only magnifies the amount of light that emits, but also encourages us to embrace change and what is new. It teaches us to constantly strive to express more gratitude with every passing day.
- 8. Become the shamash that leads the way. The Hanukkiah is made up of nine total branches consisting of eight candles and a *shamash* (literally, servant). The *shamash* is the candle to light other candles. From it we can learn servant leadership: that uplifting those around us creates a ripple effect larger than if we were to stand alone. But even more so, the shamash teaches us that when we give of our light, we do not give up any of our light, we do not have less light because we shared it with others, rather all we did was increase the light all around us. During this season, consider who has been a *shamash* in your life and how you might be a *shamash* unto others.

These are just eight of many lessons we can take away from Hanukkah. Our challenge as Jews is to constantly find meaning in the rituals, customs and holidays we observe. It is our responsibility to grow beyond our pediatric understanding of holidays and to do all we can to infuse them with relevant meaning and symbolism appropriate to the times we live in.

May Hanukkah continue to be a holiday that fills our houses with joy, light, meaning and awe!

Entering Sara's Tent

R-E-S-P-E-C-T find out what it means to me

I get tired

Keep on tryin'.....

I gotta have a little respect.

Our tradition holds up Rosh Chodesh as a special holiday to honor women for two reasons- first, that we refused to give our golden earrings to help build the golden calf, and second, we brought far more gifts than was asked of us to build the Mishkan (tabernacle). And so, to help usher in our temple's theme this year of "soulfulness," we are bringing the ancient rituals of Rosh Chodesh back to Temple Judea. On October 31st, 25 women gathered to welcome the new month of Cheshvan in honor of Rosh Chodesh. Nerves and emotions were frayed in the room, as several women had just come from voting or were set to vote right afterwards. We all strongly felt the weight of the decision - specifically that of amendment 4- on our own families, our community and our country- and we felt so strongly that being together was absolutely the right thing.

As soon as we were together, gathered in a circle, praying for peace together, laughing together, being vulnerable together- we all could feel the importance of celebrating the tradition of Rosh Chodesh. The hour went by so quickly, as women fell into deep and meaningful small-group conversations about this moment of transition- in our lives, in the country, even in the weather. For me, the highlight was definitely our "snackable self-care" karaoke moment, where we sang and laughed together as we joined Aretha Franklin's powerful anthem, "Respect." As we joined together to sing this female empowerment anthem of the late 1960s- we realized upon our relisten how powerful and how poignant those words still are today.

Soon after our celebration, Amendment 4 received 57% of the vote- but needed 60% to pass, and so the 6-week abortion ban stays in place in Florida. As a mom of three daughters, and as a strong proponent of all humans having access to necessary and life-saving medical care, I am concerned and frustrated. I'm worried about what it means for my daughters and their healthcare in the not-so-distant future. I know I'm not the only one disheartened right now about the future of women's rights in Florida and in our country- and so at this moment, I turn to our sacred texts for solace and inspiration.

Our Jewish tradition teaches that providing health care is not just an obligation for the patient and the doctor, but for all of society. Maimonides held up this tradition in the Mishneh Torah, when he listed ten most important communal services that a city has to offer to its residents- the number one item was healthcare. Concern about healthcare access has long been discussed in Jewish tradition.

Further, the rabbis tell us that a physician's job is to heal, and if they withhold medical care, it is as if they have shed blood, as the Shulchan Aruch clearly states, "The Torah has granted the physician permission to heal, and it is a religious duty which comes under the rule of saving an endangered life. If he withholds treatment, he is regarded as one who sheds blood." According to our tradition, our current regressive state laws that prevent physicians and other providers from providing health care are in direct opposition to their sacred duty. How do we live and speak truth to power on these important issues now that the election is (thankfully!) over- how do we look forward as individuals and as a community? Here are a few suggestions - please be in touch if you have others you want to add to the list!

- Call your members of Congress and urge them to support the Women's Health Protection
 Act which was passed for a second time on July 15, 2022. It was reintroduced in both
 chambers of the 118th Congress in March 2023. The Women's Health Protection Act would
 establish a statutory right for health care providers to provide, and their patients to
 receive, abortion services free of restrictions and bans that delay or obstruct access to
 care.
- Get involved and support local advocacy organizations, such as the Palm Beach chapter of the National Council for Jewish Women and Florida NOW, who are already strategizing for next steps to help support women in crisis.
- Join us at our next Rosh Chodesh gathering on December 2 at 1 pm. This is an awesome chance to find connection, comfort, laughter and inspiration in our spiritual lives which will focus and energize us for the year ahead.

As I write this, we are reading the Torah Portion Chayei Sara. This parshah begins with Sara's death, and ends with Isaac marrying Rebecca, who comes to live in Sara's tent. As Rashi teaches, while Sara was living, "There was a light burning in the tent from one Sabbath eve to the next, and there was a blessing in the dough, and a cloud hanging over the tent, but since her death all these had stopped. And when Rebecca came, they reappeared." Let us gain inspiration from our foremothers - let us continue being a resilient, strong Jewish community that passes on the light from one generation to the next. Let us support each other as we continue advocating for women's rights and equality. Let us carry on the light of compassion and care for the next generation and always, by lifting each up- now and always.

Dear TJ Family:

As we quickly approach the Thanksgiving holiday, we would like to take a moment to thank you, our sacred family, for you amazing support, participation, and engagement at our beloved Temple Judea. It is hard to believe that as we write this email, we are currently standing at 778 household members – a true feat for a temple that started only forty odd years ago! And we know how fortunate we are that we are a temple that is not struggling, but rather one that continues to grow year after year. In fact, in this fiscal year alone, we are already net +25 households. We believe our sustained growth is driven by many factors including: an outstanding spiritual experience, deep one-on-one relationships and connections with our clergy and our staff, a Hamish environment, programming that is available to any member who would like to participate in it and executing all our efforts with excellence.

As we hope you can understand, sustained growth coupled with maintaining the level of excellence that what we believe makes TJ so special, can only happen when we are properly staffed. And unfortunately, given the circumstances of this year, this is not the case. YES – we are actively searching for clergy who will continue to serve TJ with excellence – and we are confident we will find them! However, until that time, we believe it is our duty to protect our current team – our clergy and our staff, to honor the commitment we have made to you, our current congregants, and to best serve our community. With this in mind, the Board of Trustees has unanimously voted to put several measures in place to help our temple during the next few months. These include:

- 1) A temporary pause in accepting new membership applications. Any person who wishes to join our temple family will be added to a waitlist and as space permits, will be invited to join the temple.
- 2) We will continue to have a pre-oneg at 5:00 p.m. and Shabbat worship services at 5:30 p.m. We will not be offering double services.
- 3) From December through April, all Friday worship services will be for MEMBERS ONLY.
- 4) Non-members, and those wishing to join the temple, are always welcome to attend Thursday minyan at 9:30 a.m. which is led by Rabbi Yaron and Rabbi Rose and will give anyone who needs an opportunity to be in our scared community, say kaddish, and get a taste of TJ. Additionally, we will continue to Livestream our Friday night worship.
- 5) From December through April, we will only be able to accommodate one Oneg sponsor per Friday and sponsors will be entitled to a maximum of ten seats. However, if you have more people that you would like to include in your simcha, or remembrance, we are happy to offer you an Aliyah to the Torah at Thursday minyan at 9:30 a.m. You would just need to call the office in advance so Rabbi Yaron can discuss in advance with you.

Please know that these decisions were not made lightly. As a Board, and as clergy and staff, we want nothing more than to serve anyone and everyone in our community who wants to be a part of our sacred home, and it is our hope that we will be able to return to this vision as soon as possible. We recognize that these policies might cause discomfort – especially when they affect you individually. However, we want to thank you in advance for your continued support, for your understanding, for your acceptance that these policies need to apply to every member equally -otherwise they will be ineffective - and for your willingness to work alongside us as we navigate this short-term challenge.



Scholars in Residence

Steven Rubin - Sunday, January 12th at 4:00 p.m.

A former Fulbright scholar, Steve Rubin holds a Ph.D. in comparative literature from the University of Michigan. He has written and lectured extensively both here and abroad on topics related to Jewish literature. He has edited several anthologies of Jewish writing, including Telling and Remembering: A Century of American-Jewish Poetry, Writing Our Lives: Autobiographies of American Jews, and Celebrating the Jewish Holidays: Stories, Poems, Essays. He is professor emeritus and former dean at Adelphi University.

This lecture will explore the various forms, themes, and subjects that have characterized Jewish American literature from its beginnings to the present: from Emma Lazarus in the 19th century to the immigrant generation of poets and novelists of the early 20th century (Henry Roth, Isaac Bashevis Singer, Mary Antin), to the well-known writers of the 50s, 60s, and 70s (Saul Bellow, Cynthia Ozick, Grace Paley, Bernard Malamud, Philip Roth), to the works of contemporary authors Nicole Krauss, Jonathan Safran Foer, Nathan Englander, and Allegra Goodman, among others. Questions to be explored and discussed include: Is there an identifiable Jewish American literature? And if so, what common themes and subjects exist? What do various Jewish authors of different backgrounds, histories, beliefs, and eras have in common? And ultimately: What do Jewish authors have to tell us about ourselves, our heritage, and our identity as American Jews?
