We met at Sinai

Rabbi Splansky, Senior Rabbi of Holy Blossom Temple loves to tell the story about the time she taught a class for kindergarteners in her temple. She asked the kids if they knew what happened at Mount Sinai, immediately one child jumped up and said: "I was born at Mount Sinai!"

This child couldn't realize how profound his answer was. Yes, while he was indeed born in Mount Sinai Hospital in NY, all of us, the entire Jewish people were born- as a people- at the bottom of Mount Sinai, in that exact moment that God gave us the Torah.

There are many unanswered questions about what exactly happened at Mount Sinai, or even if Mount Sinai is a real geographical location (vs a metaphor.) The Torah itself has a few, at times even contradicting accounts, not only as to the name of the mountain/desert but also to what exactly happened at Sinai. You might recall the two different versions of the Ten Commandments and the discrepancy in the fourth commandment...are we supposed to "keep" (*Shamor*) Shabbat or just to "remember" (*Zachor*) it?

The Torah is not clear about what do we mean when we call Shavuot "Z'man matan Torateinu" the holiday of receiving Torah... Did we receive the entire Torah on the mountain, or did we just receive what is known as the Ten Commandments? And if indeed it was the entire Torah, was it just the written Torah or was it (as later generation rabbis claim) the oral Torah as well?

These are all great questions and a source for debate and discussions our rabbis have had over 3000 years (and will probably have for eternity.) And given, that we will probably never have absolute answers to these questions, I want to suggest that we should concentrate not on the actual story of receiving the Torah, but rather on the idea of revelation. On the message received in this sacred moment we call Mount Sinai.

According to the dictionary the word revelation refers to: "The divine or supernatural disclosure to humans of something relating to human existence or the world." I hope we can all agree that the Torah is divine. Most reform theologians do not necessarily believe it was given to us directly by God (as the Torah describes) but rather, that Torah was written with divine inspiration. That it is divine because its sacred message could have only been inspired by a divine author. It is divine because within it are guidelines of how to live our lives that are as relevant today as they were 3000 years ago, it is a divine text for it shaped the world as we know it. For it is one of the oldest texts known to humanity that has been preserved and used continuously throughout history. This text not only served as the bedrock for Christianity and Islam, but it also had an effect on all humanity, and - it is at the core of who we are as a people (yes, I don't think we would survive only on the notion that we all like bagels with cream cheese and lox!)

What does the word revelation mean to you? And is this concept relevant to how you live your life?

As you can well imagine, the concept of revelation is a crucial topic occupying theologians and philosophers in ancient, rabbinic, medieval, and modern times. Understanding revelation

demands of us to ask questions of authority and chronology. Does truth come only from God, or can it also come from the community or a principled individual? Does God's ultimate revelation of truth take place every day, or did God deliver one authoritative message long ago?

For Emil Fackenheim, a post holocaust theologian – revelation represents the end of the beginning of idolatry, and the ability of humans to then move away from the question of –"Do I believe in many Gods versus do I believe in one God?" – to the importance of belief at all and our need to understand belief especially with post 20th-century experiences of near-death in the Holocaust and rebirth in the establishment of the State of Israel .

For many others the main message of revelation is that it opens a door for each one of us to understand and interpret Judaism in a different way. The fact that we are told that "we were all there at Sinai" means that we, each and every one of us, who is unique and different than our neighbor, has the ability to understand the teachings of Torah differently, and so they believe that God's will is revealed through the interaction of humanity and God throughout history, and in that sense, Torah is a product of an ongoing revelation.

This is especially true for those Rabbis who founded Reform Judaism. For them "Sinai" takes place every time a Jew makes a serious and conscientious choice. They established the notion of "personal autonomy" which basically states that whenever we are to make a moral decision, we can do so on our own, as long as we understand the obligation to be well educated and take into consideration past Jewish teachings as well as Jewish tradition. Under these conditions, the decision made is sacred and is considered an act of revelation.

There are many other fascinating ways to understand revelation, from a notion of revelation being something that happens only in the presence of community to the founder of the reconstruction movement, Mordechai Kaplan who rejected the notion of a supernatural God in its entirety, or him, God was not a heavenly being but rather "...the process [in the world] that makes for creativity, integration, love and justice."

What matters to me most, as we approach the holiday of Shavuot, is that we all take the time to try and answer this question for us, in the most personal and intimate way.

What do we believe about the Torah? How did we receive it? What is its main message to us? What freedoms do we have in interpreting the message?

I wish us all a Chag Sameach, a holiday of thoughtfulness, reflection, study, and inspiration in which we all take one step forward and deeper in our level of engagement with Torah. After all, this past year we wrote a Torah, now it's time to, as the famous Rabbi Ben Bag says: "Turn it over, and [again] turn it over, for all is therein. And look into it; and become gray and old therein; and do not move away from it, for you have no better portion than it."



Especially on election night, but certainly throughout this election year, the whole country will be focusing on our beloved Florida. As a Temple Judea family, we might not all agree on every political issue or candidate, but we can all agree on the inherent importance of political participation. As Jews in America today, we are so blessed to be able to vote and have a voice in the leadership of our country. Our tradition teaches us that we must encourage our community members to pray for our leaders. In Pirkei Avot we are reminded, "Rabbi Hanina, the vice-high priest said: pray for the welfare of the government for were it not for the fear it inspires, every man would swallow his neighbor alive." Our tradition urges us not only to pray for our leaders, but also to gratefully participate in the act of choosing them- as Jews, we honor the privilege of democracy by participating in it. As the prophet Jeremiah teaches us, we are to engage deeply in our communities and to "seek the welfare of the city to which I have exiled you and pray to God on its behalf; for in its prosperity you shall prosper." In fact, our rabbis teach that voting is an important religious act that we need to prioritize. The Chazon Ish, a highly respected rabbi in Israel, once counseled a man who didn't have enough money to pay his taxes; therefore, he would not be allowed to vote in an upcoming election. Hearing the man's dilemma, the Chazon Ish responded: "You should sell your *tefillin* and pay the taxes... *tefillin*, you can borrow from another, but the right to vote you cannot get from someone else." In fact,

Rabbis like Laura Novak Winer consider voting such an essential Jewish act that she urges her congregants to say this blessing before they vote, to sanctify the important and urgent act.

Class 1- Self – June 13th at 10:30 a.m.


