

Welcome Cantorial Soloist - Kaylene Cole!

Rabbi Yaron Kapitulnik Rabbi Rose Durbin Cantorial Soloist Kaylene Cole Rabbi Joel Levine, DD, Rabbi Emeritus "It is not upon you to complete the work, but neither are you free to desist from it".

As Reform Jews, we draw inspiration from a wide array of spiritual, philosophical, and ethical traditions. Among these sources of guidance, the teachings of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. offer profound lessons that resonate deeply with our values, particularly in our pursuit of justice, equality, and compassion. King's commitment to social justice, his philosophy of nonviolence, and his vision of a beloved community all provide essential insights that can enrich our lives and strengthen our Jewish identity.

Once again, this year, it will be our honor to invite Pastor Samuel St. Fleur from Christ Family Worship Assembly in Riviera Beach to share with us a message from the bimah in honor of Dr. King.

I thought it would be good if we all took a few minutes to remind ourselves of the deep connections between our faith and values as reform Jews and the teachings of Dr King.

One of the core principles of Judaism is the commandment to pursue justice: *"Tzedek, tzedek tirdof"* ("Justice, justice, shall you pursue"; Deuteronomy 16:20). Dr. King's life and work embodied this principle in action. His unwavering fight against racial segregation and inequality in America mirrors the Jewish imperative to confront injustice wherever it arises. Reform Judaism, with its emphasis on tikkun olam—the repair of the world—finds a natural alignment with King's vision for a society rooted in fairness and equity.

King's activism reminds us that justice is not passive but requires consistent and courageous effort. As a temple we take pride in actively advocating for the rights of marginalized communities and addressing issues like hunger, racism, and gun violence among many others.

King also believed that the pursuit of justice must be achieved by nonviolent resistance. He saw nonviolent resistance not only as a practical method for achieving social change but also a moral imperative. When asked why the word justice appears twice in this commandment, many rabbis explain it as a commandment to pursue justice in just ways. That justice achieved not by seeking peaceful resolutions is lacking. The Talmud teaches, "Whoever saves a single life is considered to have saved the whole world" (Sanhedrin 37a), emphasizing the sanctity of life and the importance of nonviolence.

Another core principle to Dr. King's vision was the concept of the "beloved community," a society in which all people are treated with respect and compassion, where poverty, hunger, and hate are eradicated. This vision resonates with the Jewish ideal of a messianic age—a time of universal peace and justice. The prophets of Israel, like Isaiah and Amos, spoke of a world where "swords will be beaten into plowshares" and justice will "roll down like waters." King's vision challenges us to actively work toward creating a society that mirrors these prophetic ideals and reminds us that our shared humanity is greater than any differences that divide us.

But what I find might be the most important lesson from Dr. King is that his deep faith was the cornerstone of his activism. He drew strength from his spiritual convictions, believing that the arc of the moral universe bends toward justice. As Reform Jews, we can find inspiration in King's ability to connect faith with action. Our tradition teaches that faith and deeds are intertwined: "It is not upon you to complete the work, but neither are you free to desist from it" (Pirkei Avot 2:16). We fight for a better world not only because it is the right thing to do but because it is a religious commandment and part of our covenant with God!!!

When what drives us to fight for justice is an understanding that this is why God put us on this earth - I believe we will never despair from this battle even though it is easy to do so given the enormity of the challenges we face.

Whether through prayer, study, or communal action, we need to draw on our Jewish heritage to sustain us in our efforts to repair the world. Dr. King's life reminds us that faith is not static but dynamic, propelling us toward acts of kindness, courage, and justice.

As you all know by now, I strive to live with kavanah (intention), which means I TRY to plan my time and organize my life according to my middot (values)...the operative word being "try!" Because what you might not know (if you haven't yet had the pleasure of seeing my post-it-strewn office) is that organization is NOT exactly my strong suit. So, as I contemplate my resolutions for 2025 I am once again seeking inspiration from self-help and time-management gurus like Kendra Adachi. I love listening to Kendra's "Lazy Genius" podcast because she gives awesome advice on how to be "a genius about the things that matter and lazy about the things that don't." In addition to her wonderfully lilting North Carolina accent (that as a fellow southerner, I find especially comforting), Kendra fills her podcasts with helpful tips about how to focus on what matters in your present season of life.

In her newest book, *The Plan: Manage Your Time Like A Lazy Genius*, Kendra encourages each of us to examine the "season" we are in and to focus on what we MOST need to accomplish in this season, while living with chesed (compassion) for ourselves and others. As she writes, "Think for a moment about all the different seasons you've been in moving to a new place, adjusting to being single, waiting for a diagnosis, being in the middle of a renovation, walking with someone else through their illness. Do expect yourself to live the exact same way during all these seasons? I hope not...The most transformative thing you can do is regularly name what matters to you in the season you are in. You live differently from season to season, making choices depending on where you are. All of that begins by naming the season you are in with compassion."

After all, as we read in the book of Ecclesiastes: "A season is set for everything, a time for every experience under heaven." And as our sages teach in Pirkei Avot, "We are not expected to complete the task, neither can we desist from it." Our collective wisdom as a people acknowledges that while we should always be holding ourselves to a higher purpose and be working towards teshuvah (personal improvement) in every aspect of our lives- we can't do everything all at once. The idea is to embrace the season we are in- even if it's not the season we wanted or expected. As Kendra notes, "We need a break from the current time- management paradigm because its goals are different from ours. Its goal is greatness, mastery and power over as many details of your life at the same time as possible. OURS is to be wholehearted and integrated, starting where we are."

I think we can all agree that in this "season" of Jewish life- as I'm writing this, 97 Israeli hostages still remain in Gaza-- we need to continue to prioritize supporting our community and providing spiritual comfort for ourselves and our loved ones, now more than ever. As Kendra suggests, "Where you are right now is the most significant place you

can be. You can make that season more manageable by making it smaller and naming what matters to you exactly where you are." As Jews, we can't change our reality- but we can remain grounded in our present, living and acting with chesed and kavanah as we resiliently adapt to the ever-changing world. As we read in Psalm 118:24: "This is the day that God has made, let us all rejoice and be glad in it."

After all, this might not be the day (season) we wanted- but it's the one we are facing- so what's the best way to move forward in 2025? The answer is simple: baby steps. As the sages also teach in Pirkei Avot, "A small mitzvah leads to another mitzvah." And "Rabbi Kendra" agrees- her number one tip? "Start small"- classic advice for successfully accomplishing your New Year's Resolutions. As Kendra writes, "Starting small is annoying but essential. When you start small and adjust to only one challenge at a time, two things happen. One, you actually have a solution or system that works over time because you've been fine-tuning day after day instead of starting over every 6 months when you get fed up. Go for the long haul, not the overhaul."

Living a kavanah-filled life in this new year will be based on small, intentional decisions, based on our season, each and every day. If we have learned anything at all over these past few years, it's that we cannot always plan or prepare for what's coming our way. As we strive to live lives of value inspired by our tradition in 2025, let's start by becoming a genius about what matters the most, and lazy about what doesn't, and by rejoicing and being glad in each day that God has made.

She was our High Holy Day miracle.

Shortly after services, many of you came to see me and asked, "Why can't Kaylene be our full-time cantor?" Rabbi Yaron and our Board asked me the same thing! And while the next step might have seemed obvious, Kaylene was only our part-time employee, and she was doing this in addition to her teaching job at The Pine Crest School. It is fair to say that being a clergy is not simply a "job", but it is a life choice, and some might even say, a calling. Knowing this, we did not want to pressure Kaylene into giving us a quick answer, but rather give her time to contemplate making this significant life change.

Rabbi Yaron, the Board, the staff, and I could not be happier that she "said yes!" Kaylene's plan is to enroll in an online cantorial school where she will serve as our soloist while working towards her ordination. These types of programs typically take five years, and we look forward to supporting her, and learning from her, as she embarks on this spiritual journey.

When Kaylene joins our team in July, she will be responsible for co-officiating at all worship services, including Shabbatot, holidays, minyanim, and lifecycle events with Rabbi Yaron. She will also be an important part of our students' Bar/Bat Mitzvah preparation and our school.

Kaylene Cole currently serves as the Cantorial Soloist at Temple Judea and has since 2022. Prior to beginning her position at Temple Judea, Kaylene was featured as a soloist for many synagogues throughout her native South Florida area.

Personal Message from Kaylene

When thinking about my personal Jewish journey, it feels like a unique one! I came to the Jewish faith later in my life, initially through music. In 2017 I was hired to sing in a quartet for the High Holidays at a country club in Boca Raton. I left the first rehearsal feeling elated. I had never heard these melodies such as "Avinu Malkeinu" or "Kol Nidre" before (much less sung them!). It felt like a history lesson through song. The melodies made me feel as if I was taking part in something that had been happening for thousands of years. The musical settings were so evocative of the prayer being sung. I remember rushing home to tell my then Jewish boyfriend (now Jewish husband) all about it. I remember saying to him "I could sing these songs everyday"! I then started actively celebrating more holidays with him. I attended my first Passover seder and thought about freedom and injustice, lit my first Hanukkah candle and thought of the big and small miracles we experience in our own lives. I was enamored with the beauty and symbolism found within so many of our holidays. I learned how to make challah and lit the Shabbat candles on Friday nights within our own home. I completed my conversion a few years ago and happily have since thrown myself into continuing my Jewish learning.

I write to you all with so much love and gratitude. When I stood on the Bima this past Erev Rosh Hashanah, nervous was putting it lightly. Every time I felt doubt or anxiety creeping in, I thought of the love and support I have been shown by all of you time and time again. It helped quell any uncertainty or fear that I was experiencing. I am so excited to be beginning this journey with you all and even more excited to get to know you and your families more. I thank you all for your continued graciousness and hospitality towards me and my family. The Temple Judea family has been nothing but warm and loving from the very first time I stepped on the Bima, and I eagerly await many more special moments shared!





Scholars in Residence



Steven Rubin - Sunday, January 12th at 4:00 p.m.

A former Fulbright scholar, Steve Rubin holds a Ph.D. in comparative literature from the University of Michigan. He has written and lectured extensively both here and abroad on topics related to Jewish literature. He has edited several anthologies of Jewish writing, including Telling and Remembering: A Century of American-Jewish Poetry, Writing Our Lives: Autobiographies of American Jews, and Celebrating the Jewish Holidays: Stories, Poems, Essays. He is professor emeritus and former dean at Adelphi University.

This lecture will explore the various forms, themes, and subjects that have characterized Jewish American literature from its beginnings to the present: from Emma Lazarus in the 19th century to the immigrant generation of poets and novelists of the early 20th century (Henry Roth, Isaac Bashevis Singer, Mary Antin), to the well-known writers of the 50s, 60s, and 70s (Saul Bellow, Cynthia Ozick, Grace Paley, Bernard Malamud, Philip Roth), to the works of contemporary authors Nicole Krauss, Jonathan Safran Foer, Nathan Englander, and Allegra Goodman, among others. Questions to be explored and discussed include: Is there an identifiable Jewish American literature? And if so, what common themes and subjects exist? What do various Jewish authors of different backgrounds, histories, beliefs, and eras have in common? And ultimately: What do Jewish authors have to tell us about ourselves, our heritage, and our identity as American Jews?

"Faith, Courage, and Wisdom: The Language of Resilience"

Life at its core is a mystery, much of it ultimately unknowable – why people live, why people die, why the rain causes floods or suddenly stops for months, causing drought, a pandemic. Why there is suffering. It is all so unknowable. Faith is an active conversation with the invisible, the knowledge that you are limited and that when you are in the center of your universe you are in a lonely place. When you recognize the sacred power of beauty and goodness, you regain your balance and restore a sense of hope. Living takes courage. It is through the powerful spiritual principles and decision and choice that we develop courageous living. Struggle, adversity and conflict are invitation to become the hero of your life. You wake up in a dark moment of your night and decide that whatever pursues you, will not defeat you.

Wisdom is the ability to tap into your intuitive self, to listen to the whispers that tug at you, to discern your path, to shift your perspective from fear to abundance.

Rabbi Geoffrey A. Mitelman is the Founding Director of Sinai and Synapses, an organization that bridges the scientific and religious worlds, and is being incubated at Clal – The National Jewish Center for Learning and Leadership.

His work has been supported by the John Templeton Foundation, Emanuel J. Friedman Philanthropies, and the Lucius N. Littauer Foundation, and his writings about the intersection of religion and science have been published in the books Seven Days, Many Voices and A Life of Meaning (both published by the CCAR press) and These Truths We Hold (published by HUC Press) as well as on The Huffington Post, Nautilus, Orbiter, The Wisdom Daily, Jewish Telegraphic Agency, and My Jewish Learning. 




