

The difference between being clever and being wise

As we enter into the month of Elul, immersing ourselves in the process of repentance (teshuva), I am reminded of the famous teaching associated with Albert Einstein. He teaches that: "A clever person will know how to solve a problem which a wise person will know how to avoid altogether."

We spend so much time, so much effort, during this month leading to the High Holy Days, trying to be clever and fix problems that if we were wise we would have avoided altogether.

How much agony, guilt, and pain could we avoid, for ourselves and others, if only we were a bit wiser, if we were better at preventing making the errors we spend so much energy repenting for - if only we were able to be wiser, not clever.

Fortunately, as you can guess, Jewish tradition has a very direct, clear, and assuring road map for those of us seeking wisdom.

Psalm 34 presents us with a rhetorical question: "Who is the person who is eager for life, who desires years of good fortune?" The obvious answer is "all of us." We all want to live a long life, with good fortune, with not only good health but also with knowing that we are the best version of ourselves.

The Psalm continues to prescribe what we need to do:
"Guard your tongue from evil, your lips from deceitful speech.
Shun evil and do good, seek amity and pursue it."

Everything begins and ends with speech. As we read in Proverbs 18:21 "Death and life are in the power of the tongue..."

It is no secret that Judaism equates "lashon Ha'ra"- translated as evil speech, gossip, defamation and rumors- to murder. Time after time, we are told in the Torah, including in the Ten Commandments, to not bear false testimony. Many different stories, that we all heard in childhood, remind us time after time, that once we say something - it is impossible to ever truly take it back. While broken bones can be healed, and most physical pain can be treated and eventually forgotten, words leave a lasting impression on those

hurt by them. Psalm 34 is very clear that the road to wisdom starts with watching what we say.

But it is not enough- we also have to shun evil and pursue goodness. In the context of speech- what exactly does this mean?

I believe it means that it is not enough to just avoid speaking evil ourselves - we must make sure we are not taking part in those conversations when others try to engage us in them.

Orchot Tzadikim, is a book of Jewish ethical teachings. It was written in Germany in the Middle Ages and teaches that: "'Gossip slays three people — the one who speaks gossip, the one who listens to it, and the one about whom the gossip is said.'" When we allow others to engage in evil speech around us - we hurt ourselves, the stain of what we heard remains on our soul. We too cannot let go of the words we heard, and they might start casting doubt in our minds about our relationship or our thoughts about a certain individual.

I know we all like to gossip a little bit, it is hard to stop someone when they start a sentence with "Did you hear that?" But in the month of Elul, the process of self-reflection and introspection requires us to be wise, not clever, to not be part of a process that hurts others as much as it eventually hurts us. Just like in any other injustice, if we allow it to happen to others, if we allow evil speech to be discussed with other people, we are supporting a culture of slander, gossip, rumors, and hurting words that one day can be directed at us.

So, it is no surprise that our sages conclude and say that: "**The one who listens to the gossip is guiltier than the one who speaks it.** It is forbidden to dwell in the neighborhood of gossip, all the more so it is forbidden to sit with them and listen to their words."

May we all be wiser this coming Elul, and this coming year. May we avoid the temptation of evil speech, of slandering and rumors, of lies and words taken out of context. May we know how to avoid putting ourselves in these situations, even encouraging them, so that we do not find ourselves having to be clever and solve the crisis that was created, for we never know if we could be clever enough to do so.

Divine Courtship

As a great fan of rom-coms (romantic comedies), it should come as no surprise that one of my favorite blessings of being a rabbi is working with wedding couples, especially as it often gives me an excuse to share my 16-year-old wedding pictures! So again, it shouldn't come as a shock that I embrace the metaphor that the High Holy Days are akin to a romantic relationship with God. The Chassidic masters teach that the High Holidays are phases in a loving relationship. Rosh Hashanah is our engagement, Yom Kippur is our wedding, and Sukkot is our after-party where we bless the happy couple with the sheva brachot, the seven wedding blessings. The month of Elul, which begins September 2nd, is the phase of wooing and dating. The Chassidic masters see Elul as a meeting between lovers. It might seem challenging at first to think of our relationship with God as a "rom-com" - but even if this metaphor initially gives you the "ick" (a turn-off in the modern dating world) I hope it will inspire you to rekindle this sacred relationship.

Just as we are supposed to have unconditional love for our life partners (even and especially when they drive us a little crazy) - so too should we have this unconditional love for God, as it is reciprocated despite how we might take for granted the steadfast support of this relationship. Elul provides us the sacred opportunity to be courted and to make the effort of courting- to reintroduce ourselves to God by showing the necessary effort needed to sustain a lifelong devoted partnership. As my husband Matt often says, whenever I have guilted him into doing something he hates- like exercising or getting his first annual colonoscopy- he will motivate himself by saying "Happy wife = happy life." We might not feel ready to dive into the difficult and challenging work of self-reflection this HHD season. And yet- Happy wife= happy life. In this case- God is our spouse asking us to improve ourselves for our own good- and all we have to do is heed the call embedded in our Jewish calendar- the call of Elul.

Every day during Elul, we traditionally read Psalm 27 in which we declare, "God is my light and my help; whom should I fear? God is the stronghold of my life, whom should I dread?" Truly when we go through the harrowing and stressful times that are all too

common in adult life, we realize time and again that our most important relationships serve as the anchor of our lives. Our spouses, our families, our friends who are like family- and yes- God- all those who support us steadfastly are “our light and help” and - while they might not be able to improve the circumstances of our lives -they can help us feel less afraid. Yet, because our loved ones are always there for us, it’s easy to take them for granted and to get complacent about the steadfast support in our lives. All of these essential relationships require us to rededicate ourselves to them, year after year. That’s why every year during Elul, we shock ourselves into “courting” God with the daily sound of the shofar. This sound reminds us to make ourselves emotionally and spiritually vulnerable as we did in the early days of our courtship- we shock ourselves into being vulnerable with God. Each year, by doing the spiritual work of Elul, we reintroduce ourselves to God- this is who I am now, this year, as we enter 5785. We say, “I see you and I’m interested in reconnecting with you, even and especially after all this time.” In the dating world today “green flags” are known as good signs that a love interest has real mensch potential- and during Elul, it’s our spiritual job to remember all of God’s “green flags” that we might miss at other times of year. It’s a time for us to show our own “green flags” by telling God, “I’m here and I’m ready to be wooed, and I’m ready to move on from my past mistakes and show you my best self.”

I’m excited to learn with all of you during my weekly class on Elul this month, focusing on meditation and inner reflection, to help prepare us for the serious heavy lifting of our neshamot, our souls, during these High Holy Days. As we recite at the end of Psalm 27, may you -all this month and throughout the High Holy Day season- be able to “Look to the Divine- be strong and of good courage!”

This process is conducted in preparation for Rosh Hashanah when Jewish tradition teaches all humanity is called to account and a divine judgment is issued.

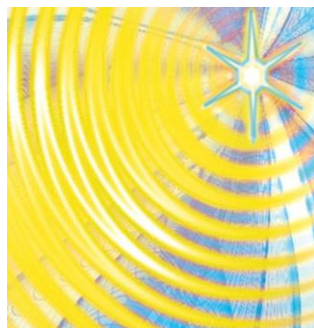
We hope you will join us this Elul in any or all our classes to help you with your personal journey.
