Beyond the Purim Costume: Finding Courage to Show Our True Faces

Symbols of concealment and revelation, masks have always been an integral part of our Purim celebrations. And as we approach the holiday of Purim (which falls this year on Friday, March 14th) I couldn't help but think of the role these Purim masks play in our lives. For these masks serve as both a joyous celebration and a profound metaphor for the complexities of identity and truth in our lives. Our sages teach us in Megillah 13b that Esther's very name comes from the word "hester" (hiding), because she had to hide her true identity. Just like Esther, we all hide parts of ourselves. We all walk around, all the time, with different masks for different situations. At work or at the club, with friends or with family, when sitting at a board meeting or dressing up to go to the theater – we switch them up faster than we might be willing to admit!

Today I want to think together with you about the benefits these masks bring to us, but also the damage they might cause and the danger they pose. You see, the various masks and identities we adopt throughout the day help us present carefully curated versions of ourselves. These everyday masks serve as shields, helping us navigate different social contexts, they help us adapt to challenging situations and deal with challenging people in our lives, these masks help us "fit in" in a world that is more complicated and divided than ever before. But these masks can also become barriers that prevent authentic connections and self-expression. They can become fake images we sell to others, and ones we slowly start confusing with our true selves. The question becomes: when does adaptive social behavior cross the line into inauthentic living?

Exploring this idea further, our Torah gives us a fascinating insight. When Moshe came down from Mount Sinai, his face was radiating with such intense light that he had to wear a veil or a mask (Exodus 34:33). But here's the thing – he took it off when he spoke to God. The message? Sometimes masks are necessary, but with those we truly value, with those we call our closest friends, when we feel we are in the presence of God, we need to show our true face. Like Queen Esther, we sometimes conceal parts of ourselves out of necessity or fear. But unlike her strategic concealment, our modern masks often become habitual, unconsciously worn even in situations where we could safely show our true selves. The challenge lies in discerning when these masks serve a purpose and when they merely perpetuate patterns of disconnection from our authentic selves and others. This story suggests that God will always see your true face. There is no hiding from that. And this, my friends, is frightening for it requires us to be vulnerable, to accept and to love who we truly are.

Vulnerability isn't easy – trust me, I know! Oscar Wilde hit the nail on the head when he said, "Be yourself; everyone else is already taken." But in today's world of Instagram filters and carefully curated social media posts, being real feels scarier than ever. Yet, just like Queen Esther found the courage to reveal her true identity when it really mattered, we too can find that strength. And just as she had the courage to tear the mask from the face of Haman, and to show the King that his beloved and trusted advisor was not who he thought he was, we too need the courage to tear the masks of the faces of those in our lives who call themselves friends but in truth do not truly care for us.

Every year when Purim rolls around, it's like God is giving us this amazing opportunity to think about our own masks and the masks of other people in our lives. Here's the powerful truth, my friends: while we're commanded to wear costumes on Purim, we're also commanded to live truthfully every other day of the year. The Kotzker Rebbe taught us that if a person is real, God is with them, but if they're fake, God says, "Either both of us will dwell here, or neither of us will." This is a powerful teaching that reminds us that just as God is authentic and real, humans are called to mirror this quality. When we present a false version of ourselves, we create a spiritual barrier that makes it difficult for God's presence to dwell with us. When we wear masks in our relationships, when we are not true to ourselves or others - God is absent. And please don't be alarmed by his uncompromising approach to spiritual truth, saying that there is no middle ground when it comes to authenticity in our relationship with others and with God. We can't expect to maintain a genuine connection with the Divine while living behind masks. So, here's my challenge to you: Let's use this Purim to commit to being a little more real, a little more authentic, and a little more ourselves. To tear off masks that prevent us from seeing the true faces of others as well as ourselves. Be your true self. That's exactly who God created you to be – and that's absolutely perfect.

IMHO (in my humble opinion), experiencing a star sighting (seeing a famous person in real life) is one of the great thrills in life. Even though it was 15 years ago now, I still remember my best star sighting like it was yesterday. Matt and I were eating at a trendy hotel in NYC's meatpacking district, and we saw Glenn Close across the bar- it was so exciting! So, you can only imagine how excited I am to experience a star sighting right here at Temple Judea when we welcome Talmud scholar and TikTok sensation Miriam Anzovin on March 24th. Miriam is a star in every way- not only does she have starworthy style, her adorable videos always featuring her signature blowouts and "Very Jewish makeup tutorials" - she is also a creative comic genius, using "millennial speak" to engage 24,000 followers on Instagram and 35,000 on TikTok (you, your children and grandchildren can follow her on both sites @miriamanzovin). Miriam, now a self-described "secular Jewish nerd and storyteller" grew up in an Orthodox family and loves combining the wisdom of our sages with modern internet culture, pop culture, and current events. Her relatable and highly insightful Talmudic commentary has garnered over half a million "likes" on TikTok.

We can learn a great deal about successfully engaging young people in Jewish life from Miriam's massive following on TikTok.

Recent data shows that for young people, who live on TikTok (and were panicked during the brief TikTok ban), TikTok is the number one provider of news and information for teenagers and young adults. And so, where, especially since October 7th, have most young people been getting their information about Judaism, Anti-Semitism, and Israel? TikTok! That is why highlighting the many talented influencers producing pro- Jewish and pro- Israel content has become more important than ever. I am so excited to learn from Miriam Anzovin, and I hope you will join us for what I'm sure will be a lively and thought-provoking presentation!

Through Miriam's "Daf Reactions" videos, in which she gives her deeply learned, relatable and hilarious "feminist hot takes" on the Talmud "daf" (page) she studies each day, she has engaged tens of thousands of young people in daily Talmud study. She has inspired so many to join her in the current cycle of Daf Yomi, the 7-year cycle of studying a "daf yomi" (one page per day) of the Talmud.

This last cycle began in 2000, and as the world went virtual during Covid, online study groups sprang up all over the world and flocked to her videos where she empowers Talmudic study as a long-distance chevrutah (study partner). Young people, feeling especially isolated during the pandemic, got to join this huge book club and connect to Jews across the world. In another popular series of videos called "Jewish Lore Reactions", she explores her favorite characters and stories from the Torah and and shares her authentic reactions, with heartfelt and comedic commentary, always finding the Jewish joy.

So many young people relate to her videos because she makes our seemingly impenetrable sacred texts accessible to all, as she role models serious engagement in text not as a teacher, nor as a rabbi, but rather as a fellow learner. Through her content, she invites Jews of all backgrounds and non-Jews as well to join her on this journey and to personally connect with Jewish tradition. As her bio puts it so perfectly, "Miriam exists at the intersection of Sefaria (Sefaria.com features a comprehensive library of Jewish text) and Sephora." As she recently shared with Hadassah magazine, "My identity helps others see themselves as learners: "Hey, if this secular feminist can love the Talmud and find profound value in it, maybe there's a place for others who don't fit the stereotype of people who study Talmud."

As committed as I know so many of us are to Jewish continuity and growing Jewish joy L'dor V'dor, from generation to generation- connecting with Jewish content on TikTok and sharing it with the young people in your lives is an awesome place to start. Miriam's success, and Jewish TikTok in general, teaches us that We MUST meet young people where they are- which we can only hope is somewhere near the intersection of Sefaria and Sephora.



GEVUROT - Turning 80 years old! Honoring all our members who have achieved this magnificent lifecycle milestone! Friday, March 28th at 5:30 p.m. and 7:30 p.m.

In Pirke Avot 5:22(ethics of our ancestors), the rabbis teach us what to expect during each decade of our lives. For example, we learn that at age forty we receive wisdom, at age fifty we become able to give counsel, at age seventy we receive the fullness of years, and at age eighty we receive strength. After all, Moses was believed to be 80 when he led the Jews out of Egypt and when he transmitted the Torah! The *gematria* (our numerology tradition which assigns value to certain Hebrew letters) of 80 is the Hebrew letter peh. The word peh also means "mouth," and since we speak with our mouths, once you reach the age of 80, you are seen as having powerful communication skills. At the age of 80, we recognize that one's strength does not necessarily come from your physical prowess, but from the life experiences and lessons that come with living for eight decades. Rabbi Yaron will offer you a special blessing in front of the Torah and we will all celebrate the wisdom, power and strength that comes with the privilege of living 80 years.

Women & War: A Post-October 7th Perspective

What we'll discuss

The lecture will look at Israeli society after the murderous attack of Hamas, through the gender lens. Wars are always a gendered and gendering event, and in Israel the war came at a time of an internal backlash on women's rights. While female soldiers

proved their bravery and abilities, women's place in the IDF is threatened by the plan to recruit Ultra-Orthodox men. Moreover, the gendered private-public divide is intensified as women are called to care for their evacuated families in the South and the North, and for their children while the father is drafted for months. These gendered challenges are created and handled while women are absent from the formal decision making table, yet are leading an alternative vision through their inspiring activities in civil society.

Prof. Daphna Hacker



Prof. Daphna Hacker is one of the most prominent Israeli feminist leaders, who combines a successful academic career with life-long commitment to advance women's status as an activist. She was a young lawyer at the Israel Women's Network, and later a board member. In 2022, she was elected by 115 countries to serve, for four years, as an expert member of the UN Committee on the Elimination of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW). Prof. Hacker is a full professor at the Law Faculty and the Women and Gender Studies Program, Tel Aviv University. She is a legal scholar and a sociologist. Her research focus on the intersection of law, families and gender, and is published in three books and prestigious Israeli and international legal and socio-legal journals.

Miriam Anzovin is a visual artist, writer, content creator, and massive Jewish nerd, exploring the juxtaposition of pop culture, nerd culture, and Jewish culture.

Some of her popular short-form video series include #DafReactions, #ParshaReactions, #JewishHolidayReactions, #JewishBookReactions, #AVeryJewishMakeupTutorial, the "Elder Millennials of Zion" skits, and more content on Jewish themes and ideas.

In The Daf Reactions Project, she shares her practice of daily study of the Babylonian Talmud in the Daf Yomi cycle from the viewpoint of a formerly Orthodox, now secular, Millennial feminist. The videos are her authentic reactions, with commentary both heartfelt and comedic, putting ancient discourse in direct communication with modern internet culture, pop culture, and current events.

Her role in her work is not as a teacher, nor as a rabbi, but rather as a fellow learner, a fellow traveler, on the path of Jewish discovery. Through her videos, writing, and art, she invites others to walk beside her on this journey and connect with Jewish teachings in ways that are relatable and personally meaningful to them.

Miriam was the first Artist in Residence at Moishe House and was previously the host of The Vibe of the Tribe podcast. She is currently represented for speaking engagements by Jewish Speakers Bureau, and The Daf Reactions Project is a grateful grantee partner of Lippman Kanfer Foundation for Living Torah.

Miriam will speak openly about how her life experiences as a formerly Orthodox woman, and now secular Jew, led her to deep emotional engagement with Jewish text study. She will discuss her spiritual journey, Daf Yomi, the genesis of her viral TikTok videos, and being a "Talmud Influencer" in the public eye.




