

On Sunday, January 14th Rabbi Yaron gave the sermon at Christ Family Worship Assembly in Riviera Beach honoring the memory of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. His topic was "What would MLK say about the situation in Israel?"

I will always remember the time, when as a tour guide in Israel, I met my first church group from the bible belt. They were all so nice, and they all were wearing bracelets with the letters WWJD.

I had no clue what that meant so I asked the pastor who looked at me as if I had been living on the moon! "Young man" he said "we constantly ask ourselves the question - What would Jesus do?

So today on this day in which we honor the Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. I want to ask a question that I am sure many are asking - What would Dr. King say about what is happening today In Israel?

This question has been the issue of some serious debate among different experts in recent years, various scholars claim they have the answer, each pulling in a different direction according to their agenda.

I think it's presumptuous to know what Dr. King would exactly say on this issue, and so I love to turn to the advice of the well-known 13th century Rabbi known as Maimonides who teaches us that we truly can't describe God, all we can do is say what God is not.

So, I want to try and guess not what Dr. King would have said, but rather what Dr. King wouldn't say today.

He would not say that Zionism is colonialism.

And for those who might not be sure what that word means let me pause for a moment to explain -

Zion is another name for Jerusalem.

Psalm 137: "By the rivers of Babylon, there we sat, sat and wept, as we thought of **Zion**."

Isaiah 2:3 "For instruction shall come forth from **Zion**, The word of GOD from Jerusalem."

Psalm 51: "May it please You to make **Zion** prosper; rebuild the walls of Jerusalem."

Zacariah 9:9 "Rejoice greatly, Fair **Zion**; Raise a shout, Fair Jerusalem!"

Zion is one of the 70 names Jews use to describe the most important city in the world for us - Jerusalem.

And when the people of Israel were exiled from the country, in the year 135 of the Common Era, they always carried Jerusalem in their hearts; they prayed facing the east as to remember Jerusalem, as they sat around their Passover tables they said year after year "next year in Jerusalem", they broke a glass at the end of every wedding quoting Psalm 137 5-6:

If I forget you, O Jerusalem, let my right hand wither;

let my tongue stick to my palate if I cease to think of you,

if I do not keep Jerusalem in memory even at my happiest hour."

Jews never forgot Jerusalem, and when the opportunity presented itself - at the end of the 19th century, they slowly started making their way back. **Back home**. Where they were re-united with a handful of families that never left the land.

My friends - if you ever hear anyone calling Zionism a colonizing movement - they are not speaking the truth.

Zionism is the return of an indigenous people to their land.

Zionism is not a movement that was orchestrated by some empire to go and conquer some foreign land to exploit its people and its treasures.

The first Zionist that came back to what was then a part of the Ottoman empire, purchased land. Just as Abraham did when he first arrived to Canaan- they had to dry swamps and plant trees in the desert, they built the first Hebrew city - not on the remains of any town they destroyed - but rather on barren sand dunes a little north of the ancient city of Jaffa.

Just a few months ago - you all celebrated the birth of Jesus. As you well know, he was born in the city of Beit Lechem - which was not in a land called Palestine, but rather in the land belonging to the tribe of Judah.

You all are familiar the prophecy that we first read in Micah 5 and is then quoted in Matthew 2:6

"And you, O Bethlehem of Ephrath, Least among the clans of Judah, From you one shall come forth To rule Israel for Me— One whose origin is from of old, From ancient times."

Jesus was born as a Jew in the land of Judeah, and it was about 100 years after his crucifixion that the Roman's ,who wanted to humiliate the Jewish rebels, changed its name to Palestine, naming it after the Philistines - the traditional enemy of the people of Israel all the way back to the days of David and Goliath.

Here is something else MLK wouldn't say - that Israel is an apartheid country.

On Friday Pastor Samuel came to our temple and told us how important words are, and especially how important the word Woke is for your community. He demonstrated so beautifully how it is a word that can be misused.

And today I am here to tell you that the same is true about the word apartheid, which the enemies of Israel use to attack it.

Let's understand the word better: Apartheid is a word translated from the Afrikaans language meaning 'apartness.' It was used to describe the ideology supported by the <u>National Party</u> (NP) government in South Africa in 1948. Apartheid by its definition means "a policy or system of <u>segregation</u> or discrimination on grounds of race." I don't need to tell anyone sitting here how awful this ideology was and how we all rejoiced when it ended in 1994- 46 years later.

While the Palestinians living in what we call the West Bank, or Judea and Samaria, or the occupied territories, do not enjoy the same right as Israelis, the reason is not because they are being discriminated against based on their race. The reason is that leaders from both sides (it takes two to tango) have failed to find a peaceful solution to this complex problem and as such these Palestinians are not proper citizens of the State of Israel.

In proper Israel there are over 2 million Arabs, mostly Muslims, and about 500 more Arabs who are Christians, Druze, Cherke, Armenian, and more. All together they make up 25% of the population who enjoy equal rights **BY LAW** - they serve in the military If they want, they are doctors, and lawyers and teachers, and heads of hi-tech companies. There are 2 Arab political parties in the Knesset - the Israeli parliament. There is an Arab serving as a Supreme Justice, and while there still exists some tensions and some injustice - mostly financial differences - in no way or means can one say Israel is an apartheid country.

Saying that is an insult to the sacrifice and suffering of so many black South Africans who suffered and sacrificed so much for half a century.

Those who start any discussion by calling Israel an apartheid country are trying to play to your raw emotions, to the natural instinct and moral compass you have which calls you to identify with those that are being discriminated against.

Don't let them.

Don't let them turn you against Israel only because they misuse and misrepresent this word.

For we know MLK believed in the right of Israel to exist.

On March 26, 1968, just ten days before he was murdered, he was the honored guest at the 68th annual Convention for the Rabbinical Assembly of Conservative Judaism with good friend Rabbi Joshua Heschel. It was nine months after the <u>Six Day War of 1967</u> when he said these words:

"Peace for Israel means security and we must stand with all our might to protect its right to exist, its territorial integrity. I see Israel, and don't mind saying it, as one of the great outposts of democracy in the world, and a marvelous example of what can be done. How desert land can almost be transformed into an oasis of brotherhood and democracy. Peace for Israel means security and that security must be a reality... Israel's right to exist as a state of security" - he said - "is incontestable."

BUT as you would expect - MLK was not blind to the suffering and the needs of the other side of the conflict.

"On the other hand, we must see what peace for the Arabs means on another level. Peace for the Arabs means the kind of economic security that they so desperately need."

He went on saying that "the great powers have the obligation to recognize that the Arab world is in a state of imposed poverty and backwardness that must threaten peace and harmony. Until a concerted and democratic program of assistance is [effected], tensions cannot be relieved. Neither Israel nor its neighbors can live in peace without an underlying basis of economic and social development."

The Institute for Black Solidarity with Israel has the following statement on their website:

"Dr. King was a staunch supporter of the state of Israel and the Jewish people, but that does not mean that he was anti-Palestinian. In fact, he embodied both ideologies, proving that one does not have to be anti-Palestinian to be pro-Israel, or anti-Israel to be pro-Palestinian."

Dr. King would do all he could to help and find a solution to this problem. He would identify both with the right of Israelis and Palestinians to live in peace and dignity.

So, what is this solution?

Dr. King spoke about this: "This solution will have to be found in statesmanship by Israel and progressive Arab forces who in concert with the great powers recognize that fair and peaceful solutions are the concern of all humanity and must be found."

And we must all agree that we need 3 forces to find a solution, an international community that helps, an Israeli government rid of extremist voices and progressive Arab leaders.

And I have to say this LOUD AND CLEAR - Hamas is not a progressive Arab force. Hamas is an evil fundamentalist Islamic organization that has no desire for peace. They have only one desire - and if you don't believe me, you can find their own mission statement online and read it in their own words.

Hamas is not trying to free Palestine from Israel's control. Hamas is trying to establish a modern Muslim Caliphate, no different then what ISIS tried doing in IRAQ.

HAMAS is ISIS.

They seek to kill anyone who is not a devout Muslim as they understand Islam. Jews are the easiest target, Israel is the best place to start - but do not be fooled - there are only 3 churches in Gaza, small churches, with worshipers who are afraid for their lives - it is Christians that will come next, and then non observing Muslims. First in The Middle East and then in Europe and then my friends everywhere in the world they can get to - including our own beloved USA.

When you support Israel - you are supporting the only democratic country in a region full of extremist forces who have no interest in peace.

What happened on October 7th -100 days ago was not an act of resistance against an occupying regime. As you all know very well, Israel withdrew from Gaza in 2004 - leaving the people of Gaza to self-govern. In 2006 those people elected Hamas as their leaders. During the last 17 years, they witnessed how the hundreds of billions of dollars that were given to Hamas were not used to build schools, universities, or technological parks - but rather mostly were used to build a huge arsenal of rockets - launched time after time into Israel, trying to kill as many people and to inflict terror, and a huge underground military complex - over 300 miles of tunnels and bunkers, to be used as a defense system for their leaders, not for the people of Gaza, when Israel retaliated to those missile attacks.

They had an opportunity to live in prosperity, in peace - but again my friends - this is not the ideology of Hamas nor the theology. Because we as Jews and Christians cannot accept what we saw on those horrific video clips on October 7th - and I am referring to the fact that whenever they had the opportunity to kill - what we heard was the cry ALLAH HU AKBAR - God is great.

NO!

We cannot accept that God's greatness is found in the death of innocent woman, children, man, elders, holocaust survivors, babies cut out of their mother's wombs.

We know better - GOD'S greatness is found in Love.

We say God is great every time we feed the hungry,

We say God is great every time we comfort the sick

We say God is great every time we plant a tree,

We say God is great every time we hear the words of prophets like MLK and Rabbi Heschel

We say God is great every time brothers and sisters come together to fight for Justice as they did then - as we do today.

So, I want us all to understand that HAMAS is the enemy of any person who seeks to live with religious freedom; the enemy of any person that wants to live in freedom. PERIOD.

My heart goes out to the innocent people in Gaza, yours should too. They are hostages of Hamas who uses them as a human shield. They are the ones paying the price for Israel's right to defend itself and to bring back the hostages, they are paying the price while their leaders live in 5-star hotels in Dubai and have bank accounts filled with billions of dollars, stolen from their own people who are starving.

I say Hamas and not Islam, for there are wonderful, loving, freedom seeking Muslims out there, and any Muslim who wishes to live side by side with you and me in peace is a true descendant of Abraham, is a true brother of mine, she is a true sister of mine.

And I need to say one more thing - Israel is not perfect, Israel has made mistakes, there are evil people in Israel, like there are everywhere else - there are Jews who are racist, who hold on to an extreme theology believing that they are supreme. I am ashamed that there are Jews who have such a misunderstanding of God's word - here is the good news - they are a small minority in Israel - they do have political power - and because of the very sick political situation in Israel they have more power than they should have ever had, but I am full with hope that soon, in a new election, the people of Israel will send them back to where they belong. To a dark corner where they should sit quietly in shame.

So yes - I want there to be a solution, these two people have shed too much blood - it is time to seek a peaceful solution.

But - the solution cannot be the slogan that you hear chanted in the streets in pro Palestinian rallies - one that you have all heard "From the river to the sea- Palestine will be free."

My friends - Think about this for a moment - if the entire land from the Jordan River, that same river John baptized the first followers of Christ, to the Mediterranean Sea, where Jonah boarded the ship trying to escape God - if that entire piece of land is free - meaning free from Jews - that means that my parents, my sister, my kids who live in Israel, my friends, my people - they are all dead.

There can be no peaceful solution when the beginning stand of your enemy in any negotiation you have is that they want it all, and that You, or I have to disappear.

The Jewish people - as I said - have the right to return to their land, and they have the obligation to find a peaceful way to share that land, but leaving the land, voluntarily or by force - that is not a viable solution.

When you say - from the river to the sea Palestine will be free- you are not criticizing Israel - which by now you know I have no problem doing - but rather you are using antisemitic language - and that is wrong, that hurts me, and my people.

And here is the only thing I will say that I know MLK would say - because he did - he would agree with me.

And I say this based on a statement made by King at a dinner event in Cambridge, Mass in 1968. _According to the testimony of Seymour Lipset who was present at that dinner, when a Black

student made a statement sharply critical of Zionism and Zionists, King said to him: "Don't talk like that. When people criticize Zionism and Zionists, they mean Jews. You're talking anti-Semitism."

Not agreeing with everything Israel does is fine, challenging its right to exist, calling it an apartheid country, or blaming it in genocide - that is pure antisemitism.

Rabbis are commanded to end their delivery with optimism - it's hard to be optimistic, but I must, I must believe the hostages will come home soon, I must believe there are enough good people on both sides who seek peace, I must believe that our friendship as individuals and as a people , that our common values of love and pursuit of peace and justice, that our shared mission of spreading Gods love in the world - that all those will prevail.

And I must believe we will have the courage to live up to Dr. King's expectations of us for he once said:

"Cowardice asks the question, 'Is it safe?' Expediency asks the question, 'Is it politic?' Vanity asks the question, 'Is it popular?' But conscience asks the question, 'Is it right?'"

Today my friends, we must do what is right.

We must stand for the right of Israel to exist and to protect itself.

We must call for the release of the hostages kept in Gaza and for the removal of Hamas from their leadership positions in Gaza - so that then - we can stand and offer relief to the suffering of the people of Gaza.

We must stand together and not allow anyone try to separate our communities, anyone make us see each other as an enemy rather than a friend.

For when we do what is right, we will restore hope to see the prophecy of Micah come true:

" In the days to come, the Mount of GOD's House shall stand Firm above the mountains; and it shall tower above the hills.

The peoples shall gaze on it with joy, and the many nations shall go and shall say:

"Come, let us go up to the Mount of GOD, to the House of the God of Jacob;

That we may be instructed in God's ways, and that we may walk in godly paths."

For instruction shall come forth from Zion, the word of GOD from Jerusalem.

Thus [God] will judge among the many peoples, and arbitrate for the multitude of nations, However distant; and they shall beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruning hooks. Nation shall not take up sword against nation; they shall never again know war; But every family shall sit under its own vine and fig tree with no one to disturb them. For it was GOD of Hosts who spoke."

Do you want to learn more about the Jewish connection to reproductive justice, and the actions nonpartisan Jewish organizations like NCJW (National Council for Jewish Women) are taking to advocate for women's health? Are you passionate about this issue and want to show your support? Please join us for our Reproductive Justice Shabbat which takes place this year on Friday, February 9th. Temple Judea will be joining hundreds of congregations across the country in hosting this event, which is organized by the NCJW and supported by over fifty national Jewish organizations, including every major organization in the Reform Movement. I'm looking forward to sharing a d'var Torah (sermon), and to discussing this critical issue with all of you that evening. This event takes place annually on *Parshat Mishpatim*, the reading of which contains the verses commonly referenced as the foundation of Judaism's approach to reproductive health, rights, and justice. In the article "Reproductive Justice: A Jewish Perspective," my colleague Rabbi Emily Langowitz explains why this is such an important Jewish issue:

"The Supreme Court held in Roe v. Wade that abortion is protected under the Constitution's Fourth Amendment, which guarantees a right to privacy, including a right to private medical procedures. For American Jews, the protection of access to abortion could also be understood under the First Amendment's free exercise of religion clause. Because Jewish law permits abortion under certain circumstances as a morally acceptable choice, or even in some cases a halachic (Jewish law) requirement, any law that limits a woman's right to choose might limit a Jewish woman's ability to make a decision in accordance with her religious beliefs. When people of faith seek to adopt laws asserting when life begins, they endeavor to enshrine their own religious understanding in law. In civic discourse, the fact that Judaism understands these issues differently can be a powerful antidote to the pervasive sense that religious voices are only to be found on one side of this debate. Judaism is unequivocally "pro-life" in that it values life in all its forms, both actualized and potential. But where that term has come to mean "antiabortion," then it is clear that Judaism allows for the termination of pregnancy under at least some circumstances and therefore calls us to advocate for civil laws that protect a woman's right to access reproductive health services."

As a mother of three girls, I am extremely concerned that my daughters won't have access to life-saving medical procedures, and to contraception that will allow them to determine their own destinies. As a Reform Rabbi, I am extremely concerned about the injustices for our entire Jewish community, and all marginalized people, that are resulting and will continue to result from the current restrictions against critical reproductive health services. In the Jewish year 5782, we lost our legal right to abortion. In 5784, because of organizations like the NCJW, reproductive justice will be on the ballot here in Florida. Together, thousands of volunteers (including my eldest daughter and I) gathered over one million signatures for this groundbreaking grassroots endeavor. The hard work of these volunteers has given us the privilege, the blessing, and the opportunity to meet this critical moment and to fully restore reproductive healthcare in our state. I pray for a world in which each of us can control our own body, sexuality, and future with support and compassion—not stigma or political interference. A world which truly recognizes women as equals in all aspects of their lives. A world in which women have the same opportunities as men to make personal healthcare decisions and to write their own life stories.

Together, on February 9th, we will explore key texts from our tradition that illuminate Judaism's approach to reproductive freedom and discuss them in the context of the events that are currently impacting reproductive issues and rights across the country and right here in Florida. We will discuss the Jewish values of providing adequate healthcare for all people, and the nonpartisan Reform Jewish values of equality and egalitarianism. We honor active volunteers of the NCJW, an organization committed to educating the community about reproductive health issues, as well as supporting bodily autonomy and religious freedom. We look forward to welcoming all of you to this inspiring, timely, and empowering Shabbat service.

WORSHIP TIMES AND SURVEY

Thank you to all our members who replied to our survey regarding worship service time. Over 56% of our households participated. 50% of our members preferred an early worship service; 30% preferred later worship; and the rest had no preference.

With this in mind, and because our membership is continuing to grow, we have decided to offer two worship services on Fridays from February 2nd through April 19th.

For this time period, services will be offered at 5:30 p.m. – 6:30 p.m. and at 7:30 p.m. – 9:00 p.m.

The 5:30 p.m. worship will be shorter and streamlined – but no less meaningful! A challah will be offered after services.

Any themed service, or visiting clergy, will only be during the 7:30 p.m. worship as these experiences require more time. A few of the 7:30 p.m. services will continue to be members only and these are noted in this publication and in the weekly constant contact. On these members only 7:30 p.m. services, should you wish to bring family, friends, visitors, or prospective members, kindly attend the 5:30 p.m. service.

After Passover, we believe we will be able to go back to one service at an early time with a pre-Oneg. We will evaluate this as we get closer to April and will base our decision on attendance and space.







Rabbi Leon A. Morris is the President of the Pardes Institute of Jewish Studies in Jerusalem.

A leading educator in the field of adult Jewish study, Rabbi Morris made Aliyah with his family in June 2014 and served as a vice president for North American programs in Israel at the Shalom Hartman Institute and a faculty member at Hebrew Union College. Prior to his Aliyah he was the founding director of the Skirball Center for Adult Jewish Learning at Temple Emanu-El (now the Streicker Center) in Manhattan. Previously, Leon served as Director of New York Kollel: A Center for Adult Study at HUC-JIR.

Ordained from Hebrew Union College in 1997 where he was a Wexner Graduate Fellow, he has worked extensively as an educator with the Jewish community of India, beginning in 1990 when he served as a Jewish Service Corps volunteer for the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee, and returned many times for shorter volunteer work. He is an alumnus of the Pardes and was a Mandel Jerusalem Fellow.

Rabbi Joseph A. Skloot, Ph.D. is the Rabbi Aaron D. Panken Assistant Professor of Modern Jewish Intellectual History at HUC-JIR. He'll be giving a talk and leading a dialogue entitled "Catastrophe and Hope: Jewish Responses Past and Present."

Rabbi Skloot is a historian of Jewish culture and religious thought and the author of *First Impressions: Sefer Hasidim and Early Modern Hebrew Printing* (Brandeis University Press, 2023), which received the Jordan Schnitzer First Book Award from the Association for Jewish Studies in 2023. He teaches courses on Jewish history, philosophy and theology, books and reading, and interfaith relations, and is a much sought after lecturer and teacher at universities and synagogues across the US and internationally. He earned his A.B. from Princeton, his rabbinical ordination from HUC-JIR, and his Ph.D. from Columbia. Prior to his appointment to HUC-JIR's faculty, Skloot served as Associate Rabbi at Washington Hebrew Congregation in Washington, D.C.
