The 'New Jewish Holidays'

Think about the charm of introducing new holidays into our lives—simple, meaningful days that bring us together, offering fresh reasons to celebrate, reflect, and connect.

Let's take a moment to explore how we can create new traditions. It's about finding those moments that matter and making them into occasions that enrich our collective experience, quietly weaving new threads into the fabric of our shared culture.

What are your thoughts regarding National Ice Cream Day!! Observed on the third Sunday in July, it is an example of communal joy in the simplicity of enjoying ice cream, from traditional sundaes to innovative flavors and toppings ranging from coconuts to Kit Kats. It's an occasion when ice cream parlors might extend special deals or promotions, inviting the public to share in this delight.

However, the complexity of our calendar of celebrations does not end there. National Ice Cream Day shares its date with a multitude of other observances: National Give Something Away Day, National I Love Horses Day, National Tapioca Pudding Day, and National Pet Fire Safety Day. Each, while perhaps appearing frivolous at first, highlights different aspects of our lives and interests, emphasizing themes from generosity and animal appreciation to safety awareness.

Interestingly, traditional observances like Memorial Day also coincide with less formal celebrations, such as National Hamburger Day, illustrating how moments of national significance can intersect with lighter cultural commemorations. This blend of solemnity and lightheartedness enriches the cultural fabric of society.

Marlo Anderson, founder of the National Day Calendar, notes that there are approximately 1,500 national holidays. With only 365 days in a year, this surplus of commemorations implies that the special days intended to provide a respite from everyday routine significantly outnumber the "ordinary" days.

This contemplation on the abundance of holidays, each with its unique meaning and importance, serves as an introduction to examining newer additions to the calendar of national observances. It invites us to explore how holidays, particularly those recently established, contribute to our national identity, collective memory, and cultural ethos. The creation of new holidays within a culture or religion can serve as a powerful mechanism for shaping identity, collective memory, and values.

In the context of Israel, the introduction of Yom Hashoah (Holocaust Memorial Day), Yom Hazikaron (Memorial Day for Fallen Soldiers), and Yom Haatzmaut (Independence Day) deserve our attention. These holidays are not merely dates on the calendar but represent a profound narrative arc of tragedy, sacrifice, and, ultimately, triumph and independence.

Rabbi Hartman eloquently captures the essence of these observances, stating:

"These holidays – bunched together within one week – are Yom Hashoah (Holocaust Memorial Day), Yom Hazikaron (Memorial Day for Fallen Soldiers) and Yom Haatzmaut (Independence Day). It would not be an exaggeration to say these three days together constitute the 'New High Holidays' season of Israeli life." This comparison to the High Holidays, traditionally the most sacred time in the Jewish calendar, underscores the central role these observances have come to play in Israeli society.

The sequencing of these holidays—from the solemn remembrance of the Holocaust and the honoring of fallen soldiers, to the celebration of national independence—crafts a collective narrative of redemption and renewal. Rabbi Hartman elaborates on the deeper meaning of this progression, stating:

"This is the real meaning of Yom Haatzmaut following both Yom Hashoah and Yom Hazikaron. It reshapes and redefines Israel as a family that mourns together, and through the memory of the price we have paid to be free Jews, it redefines the meaning of Israel. Israel must be that which remembers, and through that memory constantly commands itself to be worthy of the price we paid."

In our Jewish tradition, the calendar is marked by holidays that weave together the historical and the sacred, reflecting the enduring spirit of a people bound by faith, history, and community. Among these observances, some of the most vibrant and widely celebrated are not found within the pages of the Torah but were established by Rabbinic decree in later periods. This phenomenon highlights a profound aspect of Jewish life: the dynamic interplay between divine commandment and human agency in shaping religious practice and establishing holidays.

The creation of non-biblical holidays such as Purim and Chanukah showcases the rabbinic desire to commemorate significant historical events that have profoundly impacted the Jewish people. These holidays, though not ordained in the Torah, have become integral to Jewish communal life, demonstrating the flexibility and resilience of Jewish tradition in the face of changing historical circumstances.

Purim, for example, celebrates the salvation of the Jewish people from a decree of destruction in the Persian Empire, as recounted in the Book of Esther. The Rabbis instituted this holiday to memorialize an event where the hand of the divine was perceived through the actions of individuals—Esther and Mordecai—who navigated complex political realities to secure the survival of their people. The Talmudic tractate Megillah outlines the practices associated with Purim, including the reading of the Megillah, giving gifts to the poor, sending food parcels to friends, and enjoying a festive meal. These rituals are designed to reinforce themes of community solidarity, joy, and the reversal of fortune.

Similarly, Chanukah commemorates the rededication of the Second Temple in Jerusalem and the miracle of the menorah oil, which burned for eight days despite a severe shortage. Instituted by the Rabbis, Chanukah highlights the triumph of the few against the many and the preservation of Jewish worship and identity against assimilative forces. The lighting of the Chanukah menorah, as detailed in the Talmud, serves as a public declaration of these themes, inviting reflection on resilience, faith, and the miraculous in daily life.

These Rabbinically instituted holidays have not only enriched the Jewish religious calendar but have also become immensely popular and embraced by communities around the world. The widespread observance of these holidays speaks to their deep resonance within the Jewish psyche, embodying the collective memory of survival and the reaffirmation of Jewish values.

The popularity of Purim and Chanukah, along with the initiative to establish these holidays, underscores an essential aspect of Jewish spirituality: the capacity to find sanctity in historical experiences and to integrate these moments into the rhythm of Jewish life. This approach allows for a living tradition that can respond to new challenges and celebrate new victories, ensuring that the chain of Jewish memory and identity continues unbroken.

The incorporation of Israel's three newest holidays—Yom Hashoah, Yom Hazikaron, and Yom Haatzmaut—into the fabric of our national consciousness underscores a profound truth: our tradition is both ancient and ever-evolving, capable of embracing new moments of significance that become as deeply rooted as the oldest observances. These 'new high holidays' serve not only as a space within our calendar to mourn, remember, and celebrate but also as essential pillars upholding the ethos of our community. They reflect our collective journey, imbuing our calendar with a contemporary relevance that resonates with the realities of our existence as a people. Through these observances, we affirm that there is indeed a vital place in our tradition for commemorating our past, shaping our present, and looking forward to our future with hope and determination.

“Therefore, write down this poem and teach it to the people of Israel; put it in their mouths, in order that this poem may be my witness for the people of Israel.” (Deuteronomy 31:19)

During this “Year of Torah,” 360 households helped fulfill this final mitzvah by taking time out of their busy schedules to work with our wonderful sofer (Torah scribe) to complete our brand-new Torah. Due to the generosity of Earl Abramson z”l and Sheila Schlaggar, we were able to spend this year both literally and spiritually connecting with the most sacred symbol of the Jewish people. And for me personally, having the opportunity to be with so many of you as you shared the priorities in your spiritual lives- your families, your traditions, your ancestors, and the future generations you have inspired- has been a true blessing this year. During our time together writing the Torah, we first perused a myriad of pictures and asked ourselves- what best represents our individual connections- both unique and universal - to Judaism? Not too surprisingly, especially for so many of our young people that participated and quite a few adults as well- the answer was- food!

In addition, many members chose the photos of Albert Einstein or Sandy Koufax, two of so many Jews who have influenced us and inspired Jewish pride. As my dad often says, when a Jew does something notable or helpful in the world, it’s good for ALL the Jews. And your dedication to writing our Torah, and to our community- is so good for the Jews. But even more than bagels and lox, challah, and Katz’s deli, and even more than our notable Jews- most of you chose photos of families just like yours, celebrating Jewish traditions L’dor v’dor: from generation to generation. And what picture could be more fitting for writing a Torah, as we are commanded in both the book of Numbers and in Deuteronomy, “Take to heart these instructions...teach them to your children.” The next generation of our bar and bat mitzvah students will read from our new Torah- written by your hands. We deeply appreciate how many of you participated in this project and recognized the importance of literally making your mark in our new Torah- because it truly belongs to all of us.

Our year of Torah also inspired our YEP curriculum this year, with our students focusing on our perfectly imperfect matriarchs and patriarchs for the first semester, and on Moses (the man, the myth, the legend!) for the second semester. Our students learned about the first family of Judaism, their spiritual struggles and victories, and related to them as family members. We connected Abraham and Sarah’s “lech lacha” journey to travels we take with our families. We related Jacob’s Hebrew name that he received from God, Israel, to our own Hebrew names given by our parents. Our youngest students made little baby Moses dolls to cuddle with at home, and our older students strategized how to get along better with their siblings, emulating the “sibling dream team” of Moses, Miriam, and Aaron. By learning about Moses in detail, our students can personally connect to so many aspects of our tradition- not only the holiday of Passover, and not only our 40 years in the wilderness- but also our receiving of Torah at Mt. Sinai and the impact that gift continues to have on our lives today. And our students lived that gift of Torah throughout the year- by making sandwiches for those in need, by praying and singing together, and by committing themselves to learning Hebrew. What an amazing year, both at YEP and for our entire TJ community, for truly connecting with our Torah- the story of our people from Sinai until now.

So just in case you are not able to attend the annual meeting, on behalf of the clergy, and the leadership of the temple, I want to personally thank you for an incredible year. You should be receiving an annual report which includes information from the clergy, the Board, and recognizes donations made to the temple through March of 2024. Please take a moment to review it. We know that each of you has many causes you support – and we do not take your generosity for granted. Thank every one of you for making Temple Judea part of your charitable giving. We are indebted to each of you for being a part of this project and for the gift of your time. We are also most grateful to Earl Abramson z"l and Sheila Schlaggar for their generous donation to underwrite this project. Earl was a firm believer in supporting the people, not the cause, and his gift was made in thanks to his relationship with Rabbi Yaron. We are confident that he would be proud of what we accomplished.

Please be on the lookout for your membership paperwork later this month. Our theme for next year is “Year of Spirituality”. We hope to have our programming booklet completed in June. We look forward to sharing another great year with each of you!

There are many challenges to being a caregiver because there is no specific "job description" for that role. At our meeting we will have an opportunity to talk about situations we face as caregivers, discuss ways to manage challenges, and problem solve strategies to enhance our coping.

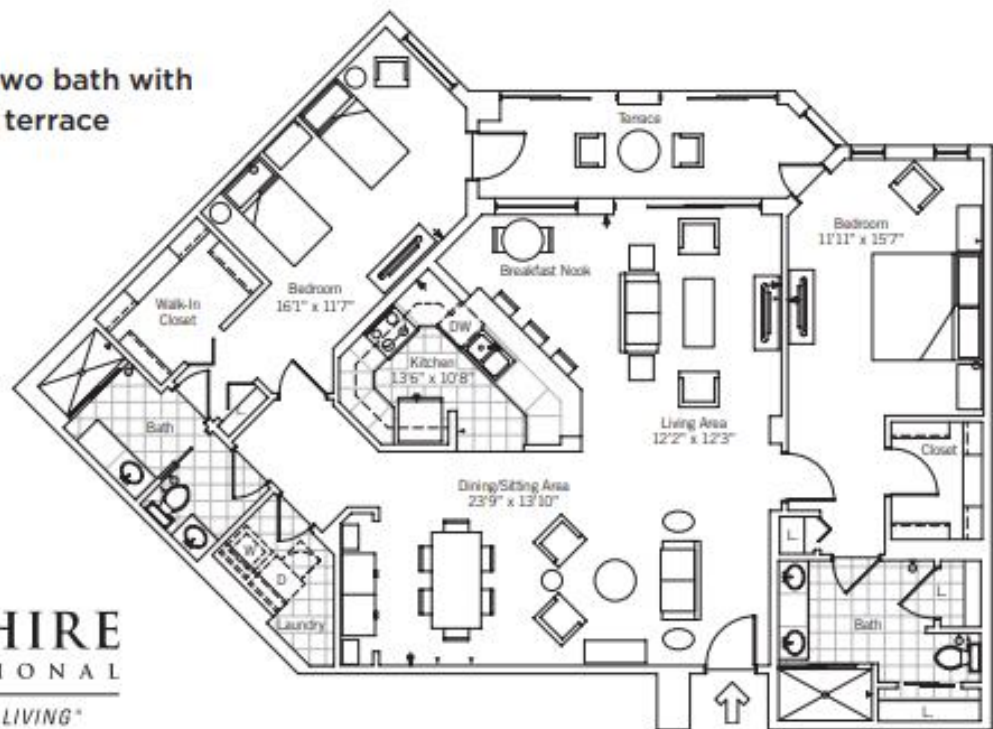

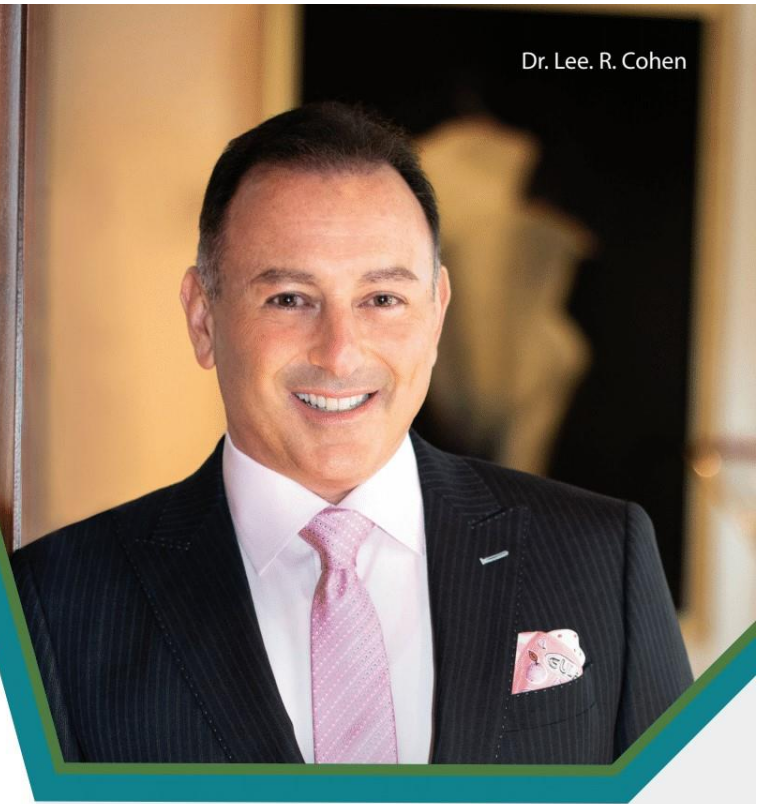
